In the midst of another winter, we continue to keep our relatives in prayer. To the elders who have endured many winters, and the young ones struggling to defend land and water, we stand with you. This past year, American Indian Changing Spirits have experienced many more accomplishments and continued to grow, literally and figuratively.

Our facility has been approved by the State of California, for a bed increase capacity. American Indian Changing Spirits (AICS) is now increased to a 30 resident bed capacity from a capacity of 16 earlier this year. The facility increase was just the beginning of new and continuing recognitions for the program.

We have been recognized from local and state political officials, as well as media outlets. A wonderful article was recently featured in local news organizations, about the history of the program. The article ran in several different newspapers and online. Rachel Uranga wrote a wonderful piece and our good friend Thomas Cordova captured beautiful images of our program. These awards were presented to AICS at our Community Sweatlodge and Pot Luck last September. Changing Spirits expressed gratitude to San Manuel Band of Mission Indians for all of their help in the past few years as well as the Los Angeles County Substance Abuse and Prevention Control.
